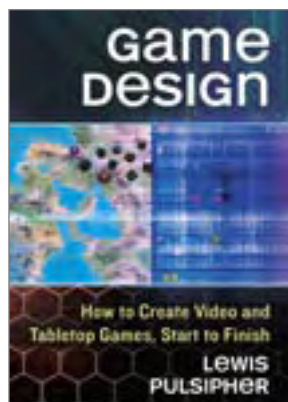
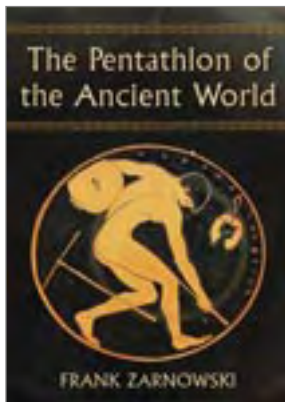


The Pentathlon of the Ancient World
